

The December Flood

I'm sure you are all aware of the flooding in December, caused by the worst tidal surge in 60 years. The river wall to the north of the village was overtopped, causing flooding of the meadow behind it. The boatyard and about 10 residences on the Quay were also flooded, as well as several beach huts and land to the south of the village.

The Environment Agency issued flood warnings to those on its register from 6am on 5th December, and their prediction of the height of the surge was very close to the actual value. As a result, most people were well prepared. The village's Flood Warden, John Smith, a previous Flood Warden, Ged Morgan, the boatyard owner, Mark Barton, and others alerted at-risk property owners and helped with sandbags, etc. The Maybush remained open and Colin Reid made the village hall available, but, in the end, this wasn't needed. The police gave evacuation advice, although most residents chose to stay in their properties. There was one casualty, who was taken to hospital by ambulance. The fire service attended to a fire around 1.30am, which was caused by the flood water shorting the electric gates of a property on the Quay. A heating oil tank and a gas tank floated off their stands, but, fortunately, remained attached to their feed pipes and the fire service was ready in case either of these caused a fire or pollution.

The river wall was badly damaged in places, and we were fortunate it wasn't breached – if it had been, some of the properties along the Quay may well have been permanently flooded. As it was, the waters eventually receded, although this was slowed down by one of the sluices malfunctioning.

Looking to the future, the Parish Council is working with the Environment Agency, the Deben Estuary Partnership and the District Council to explore the possibilities for strengthening the river wall to safeguard against a breach in the event of a similar tidal surge. Also, a group of residents on the Quay is working with these same organisations on proposals for a front and counter-wall to protect the properties on the Quay.

Finally (and I'm sure I'm speaking for everyone in the village here), I'd like to say a big thank you to everyone who helped on the night, and express my sympathies for all those who were flooded, and hope their properties are returned to normal as soon as possible.

Christmas Fayre: Another tremendous effort from the school and village community enabled us to raise £740 through the Christmas Fayre. 

Scattered Orchard Pruning and Grafting Courses at Waldringfield Village Hall

On the 25th of January, a keen group of fruit tree enthusiasts attended the fruit tree pruning and grafting courses organised by Mariah Ballam. The pruning course was led by the very experienced Marina O'Connel who runs an organic orchard in Lawford, Essex.



During the course, we learnt how to prune older neglected fruit trees, very young trees in need of formative pruning as well as trained espalier apple and pear trees. The weather held out for us and participants now have the confidence to tackle their own trees at home.

In the afternoon, Mariah Ballam and Betsy Reid ran a grafting course where participants were able to propagate many traditional East Anglian varieties of tree. The courses were much enjoyed and if you feel you missed out we will be running the same courses early in 2015.

Now in its seventh year, the Suffolk Walking Festival is bigger and better than ever before, with nearly 80 guided walks planned, covering the whole of the county. We have a lovely mix of short strolls around medieval villages and market towns and longer rambles through the gentle landscapes of Suffolk, through Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty and along the glorious Suffolk coast.

The Discover Suffolk Challenge Walk this year follows The Angles Way, which meanders for 90 miles along the Suffolk/Norfolk border, through the picturesque Waveney Valley and the sandy landscape of The Brecks. Do one day, two days or all six, the choice is yours, but as always, there will be treats and prizes for those completing the whole route.

Our themed, guided walks throughout the three week festival have some wonderful titles such as: 'Across the Marshes to the Castle', 'A Point to my Ramblings', 'Tiptoe Through the Heather' and 'Prickles' Story Walk'. You can Walk the Burma Road, learn about the Maritime Heritage of the Ipswich Waterfront, walk through Rolling Fields and a Cutting Garden and even try a free taster session of Nordic Walking.

Some include refreshments – a cream tea perhaps, or a glass of local wine and all of them are a fun and sociable way to learn about the lovely county of Suffolk. We will also be celebrating the 20th anniversary of the Stour Valley Path with a series of walks covering the length of the path over six days, with the Dedham Vale and Stour Valley Project.

We invite you to make the most of what Suffolk has to offer in abundance: pretty countryside, lovely villages, warm hospitality and a fascinating history.

NANT Update

As many people know, NANT has been pursuing a legal challenge against SCDC's Core Strategy which earmarks the BT site at Adastral Park for the allocation of 2000 homes.

It is clear to many attending the relevant Council meetings that certain members of the Council appear determined in driving through a housing policy which exactly mirrors the BT planning application for 2000 houses first submitted in 2008.

From an early stage of the Core Strategy process, the Council had closed down all other options in the Ipswich Policy Area and chose a site that is not only the furthest from Ipswich, furthest from employment opportunities, furthest from public transport, but is also just a short walk away from the Special Protection Area of the Deben Estuary.

The Deben Estuary has **the highest level of nature conservation protection in Europe**. It is also a Ramsar site, which means that it is recognised as one of the **world's most important wetlands**.

Councillors were not fully informed of the Special Protection Status of the Deben Estuary at the early stages of the process. When the special protection status started to appear in the documents before the Council, the councillors were not made aware of the significance of these designations and the Council's statutory obligations to protect the Deben Estuary SPA.

We consistently have tried, without success, to engage with SCDC. The Council would have saved several years' argument and significant public expense if they had started again from scratch back in 2009 when they appreciated the particular environmental problems of the BT Adastral Park site. Instead, rather than correct their errors, they seemed to put all their energy into trying to justify their flawed decisions and paper over the cracks.

When the Council chose to adopt its Core Strategy, NANT was left with no other option than to pursue our challenge through the courts.

The case was heard in the High Court in January. In the Judgement, the judge, Mrs Justice Patterson, recognised that SCDC went badly wrong procedurally at the early stages of developing its core strategy. In addition, there is some further criticism of SCDC in its failure to consult over the 2000 houses at other sites when it decided to double the housing allocation at BT Adastral Park from 1000 to 2000. She did, however, find in favour of SCDC.

On the advice of our lawyer, a leading EU Environmental Law specialist, NANT has now made an application to appeal because we cannot see how a proper decision can have been made on such shaky foundations, both in the normal planning process and in the Council's compliance with its obligations to protect the Deben Estuary SPA.
