ALL SAINTS' CHURCH

<u>New Benefice</u>. Many people will, by now, know that a rector has been appointed to the new benefice of eight parishes, including Waldringfield. The Reverend Ian Wilson will take up duties in September and will live in the Rectory at Nacton.

All Saints' Church Hall.

Since the beginning of 2014, we have been in a state of limbo concerning the future of the Church Hall. The "new" hall was largely funded in 1997 through the benevolence of Miss Connie Wright of Waldringfield in a legacy for this purpose. This hall, and the one which it replaced, was erected on church land, which meant that the title was held by the Diocese of St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich.

Following the death of John Pretyman-Waller in December 2013 it has been the diocesan intention to sell the New Rectory, and there was a very real possibility that the land on which the Hall stands would be included in any sale and that Waldringfield Parochial Church Council would be required to dismantle and remove the Hall at its own cost.

After representation and discussion lasting almost a year, during which the Diocese has been most sympathetic to our position, we are delighted to report that the Diocese has offered to transfer the deed/title to the land to the PCC., free of charge and encumbrance.

This will be effective at point of sale at auction of the New Rectory and will include the land on which the Hall stands and its immediate surrounds in long-standing and current use by the church. Draft legal documents have been drawn and approved by the PCC., which has agreed that right of access over its land to the newly defined boundary of the Rectory will be allowed to purchaser(s) of the New Rectory on a use and user basis.

This result is one for which we had so much hoped, but barely thought possible. We extend our thanks to the Diocese---which has been dragging its feet in the disposal of the New Rectory, but has certainly come up trumps in this respect!

In our new-found security we are able to make plans for improvements both outside and inside the Hall. The PCC has already employed a contractor to demolish and remove the ancient shed and disintegrating railway carriage from behind the Hall. Further work will be carried out shortly.

We plan a new secure shed in which to store the machinery for maintaining the churchyard - presently stored in the Rectory garage. GTS contractors have done excellent work and even took "before and after" photographs for us. They said that about twenty people called in to see what they were doing so we know that a good few people have already seen what is afoot!

The PCC has decided to keep the small parcel of land which it owns opposite the church and next to the Old Rectory on which there is a covenant that it should be used for ecclesiastical purposes.

SUFFOLK COUNTY COUNCIL














Waldringfield Church Field Trust

Our Village Verges

Verge planting in the village expands into summer! There have been many appreciative comments about the spring bulbs (with lots of grape hyacinths new this year - but the Wildlife Group's efforts to make a summer splash have not been so obvious: for those with eagle eyes there is plenty and some doing really especially the stitchwort on Cliff Road and School Road and oxeye daisies buttercup multiplying in the Sullivan Place strips. This year, following a little 'guerrilla garden' trial last year the triangle by the school / village hall should be full of bright flowers for pollinators - not many of which will be wild native plants, but all with simple flowers that provide plenty of nectar and pollen from a mix developed by the bee research unit at Southampton University. The apple trees on Village Way will be similarly under planted and all by children the primary school. at

And we have our very own unwanted alien! Alexanders is a plant introduced by the Romans to be eaten (try if you like – but you need to catch the celery like stems very young) so is strictly an 'endemic' - not native but here for so long that it deserves that status. In recent decades it has begun to misbehave and take over roadside verges. It comes into growth very early and rapidly shades everything else out. It seeds early and prolifically and the clumps also increase vegetatively. The AONB dig it out a little working group has been doing the same for the verge opposite the school. If you see it please pull it up, or at the least cut the flowers off. Perhaps we can keep it out of the village and our verges various and pretty! Waldringfield Wildlife Group - Nightingale Walk

SWT Newbourne Springs, 4th May 2016

At 6.00am, a Nightingale was calling just 30 yards away from the car park at the Suffolk Wildlife Trust's Newbourne Springs Reserve. This was an excellent start for the 16 people who had assembled for the WWG 'Nightingale Walk' there.

Although it was a clear, still morning, and there was warmth in the early morning sun, the shaded valley was noticeably a degree or two cooler than the open heathland area.



Dunnocks, Chiffchaffs, Blackbirds, Song Thrushes, Robins and Wrens were calling in the woodland alongside the stream and it was good to see flowering Butterbur, Kingcups and Primroses. Bluebells were flowering along the path side on the drier land and the woody parts of the heath. It was here that another Nightingale was located and then a third bird burst into song near the northern entrance to the reserve. This one performed superbly and we spent several minutes entranced by the range of rich notes, made quite perfect in the still air.

Continuing our circuit of the reserve a Tawny Owl was spotted perched in ivy-covered scrub. Eyes closed, it didn't seem to realise that numerous pairs of binoculars were trained upon it!

Back at the cars our alfresco, 'gourmet' breakfast of bacon rolls, quails' eggs, frittata, croissants, fruit and more, was enjoyed by all.

It was agreed that we had had excellent weather conditions for the walk, the Nightingales had performed on cue and, not unsurprisingly, breakfast had been a great success.

Bumblebee survey

Members of Waldringfield Wildlife Group are taking part in a nationwide survey to try and understand why bumblebee numbers are in decline.

The BeeWalk is a national scheme run by the Bumblebee Conservation Trust to monitor bumblebees across the country. Volunteers regularly walk a set route between March and October, identifying and counting the number of bumblebees. Waldringfield residents have committed to monitoring a transect towards Newbourne every month.

All the information will help the Trust detect early warning signs of population decline because of changes in land-use and climate change.

Greener Waldringfield

On April 22nd, 165 countries signed a deal in Paris to tackle climate change. But 55 countries still need to ratify the agreement before it comes into force, and many scientists are concerned that the agreement doesn't go far enough.

Waldringfielders have done a lot to make the village more sustainable, community minded and wildlife friendly – we have wildlife, gardening and composting groups, and residents volunteer at coffee mornings, the school and Village Hall events, among other things.

At the last Parish Council meeting, in response to our proposal for a pesticide -free Waldringfield, it was agreed to contact the Parish Council's contractors to confirm no use of pesticides on council-managed land, and to ask the County Council to do the same

Pesticide Campaign

Every year, toxic pesticides are used in streets, parks and open spaces. For example, Glyphosate, an ingredient in one of the most common weed killers, has been linked to cancer and birth defects and is harmful to wildlife. **Neonicotinoids**, a class of insecticide, have been linked to the decline in bees.

But there are alternatives, and cities like Paris and Copenhagen have already stopped using pesticides in public spaces. In France, 900 towns and cities have gone pesticide-free. There are safer systems like foam or hot water and, best of all, hand weeding or hoeing.

A group of local residents want Waldringfield to follow their example. Could we persuade local contractors not to use dangerous chemicals and encourage all residents not to use toxic chemicals in their gardens?

Extended weekend hours at Suffolk's Household Waste Recycling Centres

From Wednesday 1 June 2016, the opening hours at Suffolk's Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRCs) will be changing to offer site users extended hours on Sundays, Bank Holidays, and on a Thursday evening during the summer months, reflecting the times when the sites are most used and needed by residents.

The busiest times of the week for these sites are the weekend and bank holidays. The quietest day of the week is consistently a Wednesday. As a result of this, all sites will be closed on a Wednesday.

The new opening times for Suffolk's Household Waste Recycling Centres are as follows:

April - September

Monday – 9am – 5pm Tuesday – 9am – 5pm Wednesday – Closed*

Thursday — 9am – 5pm (late night opening until 7pm during May - August)*

New flood widget

Changes to the Environment Agency flood widget


The Environment Agency has developed a new flood widget which can be placed on any website to show flood warnings. The new widget replaces the existing version that may feature on your website.

In April 2012 we developed and launched a flood widget. The flood widget is computer script or code that web developers can use and embed within any website. It provides live information displaying the number of Environment Agency flood alerts, flood warnings and severe flood warnings in force. The flood widget uses the Environment Agency's open data and provides the latest summary of flood alerts and warnings. The widget is designed to update every 15 minutes.

The Environment Agency is carrying out a large programme of work to review and improve our flood services. The flood widget is one of those services. The widget has proven popular since it was launched in 2012. We have reviewed the need for the widget and have made some improvements to how it looks.

The new flood widget

The new widget has been re-designed to provide either a national (England) view or a county-based view. You are able to download the new widget at https://environment.data.gov.uk/flood-widgets. We plan to launch the new widget on 8 April 2016. Both the old and new widget will be available for around 8 weeks before we turn-off the old flood widget.







Updating your website

If your website features the existing flood widget, you should replace it with the version which can be downloaded from https://environment.data.gov.uk/flood-widgets. You can choose which design and location you want to feature. The old widget will only continue to work till the end of May 2016. It is important that you update your website with the new widget before June if you want to continue to receive the service.

If your website visitors require flood warning information for Wales they will be unable to get this through the new widget. Natural Resource Wales (NRW) are responsible for the flood warning service in Wales and they don't currently plan to provide an alternative widget. If you want to direct your visitors to flood warning information for Wales you can instead provide a link to NRW website at

Do you or someone you know struggle to live without central heating?

Suffolk's Warm Homes Healthy People service (supported by all the District, Borough and County Councils in Suffolk) has secured funding from central government to help 270 households across Suffolk have fully-funded central heating. Terms and conditions apply.

To qualify, households *must meet one or more* of the following financial criteria: Have a household income of less than £17,000; or be in receipt of Pension Credit; or be in receipt of any other means tested benefit; or spend more than 10% of net household income on fuel; or be in substantial fuel debt (over £1,000). In all circumstances the property must be owned by you or be privately rented (i.e. not a council house or housing association property) and *must only have room heaters, open fires or storage heaters.* Personal saving must also not be in excess of £20,000.

In most circumstances the works will be carried out at no charge to you but if you rent privately your landlord may be expected to fund some of the costs. This will be determined as part of the assessment process.

Due to the limited funding more vulnerable residents will be given priority.

The Suffolk Community Barn Owl Project

In 2015, the Suffolk Community Barn Owl Project (SCBOP) reached its 10th year, with over 1800 nest boxes installed throughout Suffolk. The project was set up with the aim of protecting and increasing the population of barn owls in Suffolk that were in serious decline. That decline has now been reversed, thanks in large part to the success of the Project under the leadership of Steve Piotrowski, SCBOP Project Director at Suffolk Wildlife Trust. This success was recognised in 2015, with the award to SCBOP of Suffolk County Council's Greenest County Award in the Landscape and Diversity Category. SCBOP's principal partners are Suffolk Ornithologists' Group, Suffolk Wildlife Trust and the British Trust for Ornithology. Community involvement was a priority from the start and every parish in Suffolk has taken part.

The Suffolk Community Barn Owl Project in Waldringfield

The success of the SCBOP project is very good news but annual barn owl numbers fluctuate a great deal and they continue to need help. The Waldringfield Wildlife Group (WWG) joined SCBOP in 2008 with project launch led by Steve Piotrowski. Steve gave us an illustrated talk on barn owls and Malcolm Farrow, from the Suffolk Coasts & Heaths Unit, outlined the plans for managing the area to conserve wildlife habitats. Then followed a garden party feast and installation of a barn owl nest box in a member's garden by tree surgeon Paul Jackson. Over the autumn and winter, funds were raised, five nest



boxes were installed in and around Waldringfield and two members of WWG were trained and registered as barn owl nest box monitors. A third registered monitor will join the team for the nesting season in 2016 (note that it is against the law to inspect a barn owl's nest without a licence). Inspection of our local boxes started during the nesting season of 2009 and has continued annually since then. In 2010, three more nest boxes were added, so eight were monitored each year. Since 2014, access to two of the boxes has been withdrawn due to change of land ownership, so the total number of accessible boxes monitored is currently six.

Over the six years of our project's life, we have recorded a maximum of three boxes as occupied by barn owls at any one time, although broods were present in only two of these, the third apparently being used as a roost by an adult barn owl. Each year the same boxes tend to be occupied, indicating site fidelity. Stock doves are also attracted to the boxes and have often produced continuous broods, sometimes with new eggs laid before the second chick of the previous brood has fledged. Other occupants recorded have been squirrel, jackdaw, great tit and a hornets' nest.

The total number of barn owl chicks hatched since 2009 is 19, and 18 of these were fitted with leg rings by a licensed ringer. Fifteen of the 18 chicks fledged successfully but three did not survive. The main factor influencing survival is availability of sufficient food for the chicks, with breeding success following the fluctuating population of their favourite prey, the short-tailed vole.

Other small mammals and occasionally birds are also taken by barn owls. The storm surge and floods of winter 2013/14 also had a detrimental effect on survival; one of the main hunting grounds used by Waldringfield's barn owls was flooded, so any nests of the vole and other small mammals were destroyed.

The fluctuating success of Waldringfield's local project has followed the same pattern as that in Suffolk as a whole. In 2015, brood sizes in SCBOP's nest boxes throughout Suffolk were small. This compares with a disastrous year in 2013, followed by bumper broods in 2014. The vole population followed a similar trend, being low in 2013, very high in 2014 and low again in 2015. It is wonderful to see barn owls hunting during the day but it usually means that their favourite food is in short supply so they have to hunt more frequently and for longer. In 2014, a record number of almost 1,000 barn owl chicks were ringed in Suffolk by the SCBOP group compared to an estimated 60% reduction in 2015. Only 305 chicks had been ringed by 10 August 2015 (although records for 49% of the nest boxes were still to be submitted).

Overall, however, SCBOP has had a positive effect on the population of Suffolk's barn owls. As Steve Piotrowski said in his 2015 report (p1), "This is a project of which all Suffolk people can call their own and we can be truly proud of our achievements".
