THREE WEEKS IN **STRATFORD**

- a Paralympic **Experience**

No doubt many of us saw the excellent BBC drama "The Best of Men" which told the story of how Sir Ludwig Guttmann started the Paralympic Games from Stoke Mandeville Hospital.

A full Village Hall was privileged to hear a fascinating talk by Sir Ludwig's daughter, Eva Loeffler OBE, who escaped Nazi Germany along with her father, mother and sister.

It was very fitting when she was asked to be the Village Mayor at the 2012 Paralympics. She gave us some interesting insights. You could not help but be moved when she told us that five competitors from the third world were diagnosed with early stages of cancer and then there was the case of the blind competitor who was offered laser treatment and had his sight partially restored.

Eva said that she had many gifts from overseas teams, but only kept two. One was a Panama hat from the Equador team for her husband and the other was a special plaque from the Afghan team.

This can be seen in the photograph along with Gareth Thomas holding the Paralympic torch which Eva carried on the very first leg from Stoke Mandeville. The proceeds from the evening totalled £452 and were donated to the charity Wheelpower. Stan Baston



In late January, just as the snow began to melt, a keen group of 30 people from the village and beyond attended at fruit tree pruning course led by organic fruit farmer Marina O'Connell, and organised by Waldringfield, Newboune and Hemley Scattered Orchard.

We began at the Kennedy Room in the Village Hall where Marina explained some basic theory of how different trees tend to grow, and how best to prune them for both longevity and fruitfulness. We then headed out to the playing field where we operated on the young trees planted last winter, as well as a neglected mature apple tree which will hopefully now have a new lease of life.

We gave one of Anna Carter's trees the same treatment and then moved on to Village Way, where we were shown how to prune the trained trees so that they will grow horizontally along the fencing, rather than upwards. It was a most enjoyable and useful experience that will hopefully mean more fruit this year!

next field while we were digging.

Church Field is entering into another environmental stewardship scheme in March as we are managing the different habitats in wildlife friendly ways. This means we receive a small amount of funding from the government which all helps with maintenance.


