A Tree Warden Writes



Free Trees and Hedging

In April I attended the Suffolk Tree Warden Annual Forum and Annual General Meeting at Ufford to hear of new developments in the world of trees. The meeting included an update from Edwin Van Ek, Outreach Adviser for the Woodland Trust. This year they are financing a push to plant more trees in the countryside, particularly in view of the Ash Dieback disease. Numbers of trees have been declining at an alarming rate for many years, but the likelihood of ash disease spreading and the devastation of the ash trees in the countryside may lead to an even faster loss of

trees. To this end, packs of 50 trees of a number of large growing species including oak, hornbeam and small leafed lime, are being made available to tree wardens, to plant, with landowners' permission, in suitable places in the countryside. These do not have to be by a public footpath and can be on land belonging to private individuals or other owners.

In our village you may notice many of the larger oaks trees are of similar age and are beginning to decline. The trees for future generations need to be planted now.

Existing non ash trees in hedgerows could also be tagged to prevent cutting along with the hedge, as hedge trees of the future.

Filling in Hedges

Hedgerows in general act as vital ecological resources. They form wildlife corridors, provide shelter and foraging for many species, and reduce erosion by wind and run-off.

We can also obtain packs of hedging plants in various mixes of native species, such as hawthorn, blackthorn, hazel, rose etc. Anyone thinking they may have potential to infill gaps in a hedge or a corner where a larger tree can be planted is invited to get in touch with me as soon as possible, as I need to get the order in by the end of June. The actual trees would not arrive until November when they would be planted while dormant. All the canes and tree protection tubes would be supplied.



We also heard about interesting projects in other parishes. Tree Wardens are supported by the Tree Council, which was started in 1974 as the effects of Dutch Elm Disease became apparent.

Calling all Villagers and Village Landowners – let's protect and enhance our village by creating Waldringfield Woodland

For some years now it's been my dream to plant a woodland somewhere on the outskirts of our beautiful village. We are so fortunate to benefit from the many wonderful habitats that both land donors and hardworking village volunteers have created in recent years, but woodland is the one natural wildlife habitat that we lack.

Having spoken to many residents about this plan, some have suggested planting trees in less-used corners of odd-shaped fields and replanting both hedgerows, and larger trees in hedgerows. Both of these suggestions are great ideas and things that I would very much like to do, but they don't satisfy my desire to plant a substantial area of mixed woodland. There are several reasons to go for a bigger area. Firstly, in light of last year's report from the UN's International Panel on Climate Change, stating that we have roughly a decade to significantly reduce our carbon emissions, if we wish to avert the worst effects of a temperature rise of greater than 1.5°C, I feel a great urgency to do what I can to assist in meeting this challenge, and planting lots of trees is one of the best ways that we can help mitigate for our emissions. In response to the report, many countries have set a target of planting a billion trees in the next 5 years. Sadly, we don't currently have such leadership, but that should not stop us from acting. I'm also very aware that the building of a new town on our doorstep will begin imminently, bringing with it further pressure on our environmentally sensitive and much loved AONB. If we were able to position such an amenity as a large woodland between the village and the new town, then new town-dwellers would have another close-by destination that isn't our already overly-busy village, at peak times. Perhaps the woodland could also combine a quantity of car parking space, which would lessen the traffic into the village, as people seeking a day out in Waldringfield could then easily walk into the village.

Some might argue that we should not plant woodland on agricultural land. This is an argument that I completely understand, and it is true that we will need all the land we can grow on if we are to stop importing food at a cost to our planet. However, the current national policy of allowing development on greenfield sites does mean that our agricultural land is also under threat from development — a far more permanent loss of our ability to use the land to feed ourselves.

I propose that we come together financially to buy some land upon which we can plant **Waldringfield Woodland** to protect our wildlife and our village from further development, whilst at the same time mitigating some of our carbon emissions.

I am currently talking to landowners about what might be possible, and if I come up with a solution I will be in touch to call a meeting. If you own land and are interested in the plan, or if you would like to be involved in any way, please get in touch.

A MESSAGE FROM SUFFOLK POLICE

As the days gradually get longer (and hopefully warmer!), we naturally tend to have windows and doors open more, spend more time in the garden and take time out to enjoy the beautiful Suffolk countryside. Please take every opportunity to ensure that criminals are not able to spoil your day by following a few simple steps:

- Always lock your external doors, even when you are at home.
- Check the doors and windows are secure before leaving the house or at night, especially doors like French doors that may not have been used for months. Don't assume another member of the household has done it.
- Don't leave keys in the locks or within reach or sight of the door or window. Make sure you have a fire plan so everyone in the house can leave quickly in the event of an emergency.
- Windows should be left secure when the room is unoccupied.
- Never leave a door or window insecure to allow a pet or family member access.
- Never leave car keys within reach or sight of the doors or windows.
- Lock cycles in a secure shed or garage. Fit a secure ground anchor and lock them to that too.
- Always lock tools away after working in the garden to prevent them being used to force entry.
- Ensure your rear garden is secure and lock gates.

All Saints' Church

Easter Day The most important time in the Christian calendar was celebrated with a joyous and well-attended service, surrounded by beautiful flowers, Easter baskets and other decorations generously provided by volunteers. We all enjoyed chocolates at the end of the service.

New Books We are delighted to be using the new communion service books, which thankfully restore the traditional Lord's Prayer. The books were generously donated in memory of David Dearlove, whose family have had many years of connection with Waldringfield, and who latterly made his home here with Bridget.

Baptism The Welham family has a long tradition of weddings and baptisms in All Saints. Granddaughter Emma Adams and her husband Terry returned with their third son to be baptised. Otis Albert was christened by the Reverend Canon Ian Wilson in what the family has said was a truly happy and joyous occasion.

Weddings Emma Morton-Clements and Jeremy Doe, two of our congregation from Rushmere St Andrew, will be married at All Saints by Ian Wilson on 13th July and banns have been read for the first time. Charlotte Bland and Carl Page will be married by Ian on 31st August. We wish them much happiness.

Annual Yachtsmen's Service on the shore at 6.30pm on Sunday 30th June. The preacher will be our bishop, the Right Reverend Martin Seeley, who as of last week was unaware that he would be brought by boat in the traditional flotilla procession. The Woodbridge Excelsior Band will be playing, as ever. Collection proceeds, after expenses, will be divided equally between All Saints and Felixstowe Coast Patrol. This is a very small charity, run entirely by volunteers, to provide in-shore safety to the many visitors who flock to enjoy Felixstowe's beaches, many of whom are unaware of any dangers which might not be evident. Funds are stretched, with volunteers having to buy their own kit at around £500 each. We hope that you will support and enjoy this traditional occasion.

Damage was sustained to the church hall on two occasions in less than two months, once by unauthorised vehicles parked by the Highways Department's contractors and again by a gigantic articulated lorry and trailer "lost by satnav". Costs have to be borne by the PCC as it is not possible to prove damage, and our insurance carries an excess. If you are walking near or visiting the church and see such large vehicles using the drive, you don't have to become involved but PLEASE take a registration number.

Good news Many will be unaware that the land on which our greatly valued church hall stands does not belong to the PCC, and there has been clear danger that we could be required to demolish or remove the hall. After four years of sometimes fraught negotiation and dogged persistence, we are now on the brink of the Diocese transferring the land to the ownership of the PCC. The Deed of Transfer has, after having been rejected by the PCC on more than one occasion, now been drawn to our satisfaction, signed and returned. The transfer will take place hopefully next month which means that we should be secure. We are still negotiating with the owners of the New Rectory over maintenance costs of the shared access. Never a dull moment in the church! The PCC maintains our truly lovely and historic church and the not so lovely but oh so useful hall on behalf of the village. Enjoy the peace and tranquillity of our wonderful asset, and perhaps think now and again what you could do to help in this task.

Grant We are grateful to the Parish Council for their annual grant which is ring-fenced for the upkeep of the churchyard, and which goes a fraction of a way towards the costs.

SUFFOLK COUNTY COUNCIL

SEND

Suffolk, like many other local authorities, faces a large increase in demand for placements for a variety of special educational needs and disabilities (SEND). Suffolk's SEND Sufficiency Plan (2018) identified that the number of children and young people with SEND will increase by 18% between 2017 and 2020. This compares to an overall growth in the school age population in Suffolk of 4%. Working together with parents/carers, education providers, partners and children, Suffolk County Council wants to create more specialist education places. On 23rd April, Suffolk County Council's Cabinet agreed a financial investment of up to £45.6 million to support the development of a number of local specialist provisions. This



will enable Suffolk children to have the opportunity to strengthen their roots within their local community. The £45.6 million investment will create over 800 new specialist education places in the county. This will include three brand new special schools and 36 specialist units attached to existing mainstream schools. A significant number of these specialist units will be opened by September 2020.

Preferred Primary School Policy

On 16th April, the council reported that it had received 7,505 applications from parents indicating which primary school they would prefer their child to be educated at in Reception for this year. Over 98.6% of children were offered a place at one of their parents' preferred schools. Some 7,037 children received offers for their first preference school and 7,403 children received an offer for one of their three preferred schools.

New School Travel Policy

September 2019 sees the implementation of Suffolk's new school travel policy for 5 to 16-year-old children. Children who will be starting at a new school in September 2019 will be eligible for SCC funded school travel when they live over 2 miles (under 8 years old) or 3 miles (over 8) walking distance from their nearest suitable school that would have had a place available for them. The new policy is being phased in to protect travel arrangements for children who are already receiving SCC funded school travel under the current policy.

Domestic Abuse Champions Network

A search is underway for volunteers to join a network of Champions to spread the message of support for those experiencing domestic abuse. The Network is looking for people who are eager to raise awareness of domestic abuse and to make changes. The Champions will provide free training to equip for skills: to spread awareness, recognise signs of abuse and share information for support within organisations and networks. 

MARTLESHAM SURGERY - PRACTICE & PATIENT GROUP (PPG) NEWS

We have been a bit quiet over the past couple of months because we've been busy welcoming FIVE new members to our group – a big thank you to all our members, new and existing. We've also been working on an exciting new project.

As a PPG, we were delighted to obtain funding to run a series of three falls prevention programmes over the next year, which could help up to 24 patients. The surgery identified those who are at higher risk of falling as a result of muscle weakness, poor balance or other long-term health conditions. The PPG then hosted an information event on 16th May to explain more about what's involved. If you were invited to attend but couldn't come on that date, it's not too late.
